In the last few decades, 'happiness' has been promoted as the normal state of being to which we should all and always aspire. Furthermore, we have been encouraged to personally work on reaching happiness in all aspects of life and to hide sorrow, or at the very least hastily alleviate it, rather than dwell on feelings of sadness. While today's culture demands we must all, and can all, be happy all the time if we just tell ourselves, it is so no matter our personal circumstances and looks to remove sadness as a normal part of human emotional system.

More recently, with the invention of 'functional magnetic resonance imaging' (fMRI) scanners, scientists have begun to be able to delve deeper into the intricacies of sadness, how it works in the brain and the impact of this on our thoughts and behaviors.

### Sadness can improve memory

Numerous psychological tests have found that when people are in a bad mood this can improve their memory. Tests have helped to show that people in a negative frame of mind are also less likely to have their memory of an event manipulated by later misinformation. They also found that people who were induced to feel happy made more mistakes and were more likely to take on misleading information.

### Sadness can lead to more correct judgements

Freud noted long ago that those suffering feelings of sadness were more skilled in spotting the truth of situations, particularly in relation to themselves. However, later studies by cognitive behavioral therapists have also found that the increased self-awareness linked with sadness is also extendable to being better able to read others. A particularly interesting finding showed people were less likely to make social misjudgments about people due to biases as well as being less gullible and more able to notice deception.

Throughout history, sadness and bad moods have been valued for being a normal part of being human and an inevitability of life that helps us deal with the challenges we face during our lives. However, in recent years, chasing happiness and setting unattainable goals of near permanent states of bliss seems to have been causing widespread dissatisfaction and even contributed to the expansion of depression. Only by learning to understand all our emotions and not at once push sadness away can we become more human. So it is okay to feel sad sometimes in life, it's a natural part of our psychology.

# EPITOME OF SUCCESS SHASHI THAROOR

In 1996, Tharoor was appointed Director of Communications and Special Projects and Executive Assistant to Secretary-General Kofi Annan. Tharoor was appointed as Interim Head of the Department of Public Information (DPI) at the Assistant-Secretary-General level. He was subsequently confirmed as the Under-Secretary-General for Communications and Public Information (UNDPI).

In 2012 Tharoor was re-inducted into the Union Council of Ministers with the portfolio of minister of state for HRD. In this role he took special interest in the problems and challenges of adult education, distance education and enhancing high-quality research by academic institutions. Many note that it is his combination of wit, charm, wry humour, and intelligence that make him accessible and held in high esteem, both in India and abroad.

Tharoor began writing at the age of 6 and his first published story appeared in the Sunday edition of The Free Press Journal, in Mumbai at age 10. His World War II adventure novel Operation Bellows about a RAF pilot Reginald Bellows, inspired by the Biggles books, was serialised in the Junior Statesman starting a week before his 11th birthday. The Great Indian Novel had 43 reprints as of October 2014, and a Silver Jubilee special edition was issued on the book's 25th anniversary in October 2014, by Viking Penguin India. The Elephant, the Tiger and the Cellphone has also undergone several hardback re-prints. Currently, he is also on the Board of Advisors of India's International Movement to Unite Nations (I.I.M.U.N.).

Born in London, UK, and raised in India, he worked across the world. In 1975, Tharoor graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from St Stephen's College, University of Delhi, where he had been president of the student union and also founded the St. Stephen's Quiz Club. Within the same year, Tharoor went to the United States to obtain M.A. in International Relations at The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University in Medford. Tharoor further obtained his Master of Arts in Law and Diplomacy and his Ph.D. in International Relations and Affairs. Tharoor was awarded the Robert B. Stewart Prize for best student and was also the first editor of the Fletcher Forum of International Affairs. At the age of 22, he was the youngest person to receive a doctorate in the history of the Fletcher School.

Tharoor was a career official at the United Nations, rising to the rank of Under-Secretary General for Communications

and Public Information in 2001. In 2009, Tharoor began his political career by joining the Indian National Congress and successfully represented the party from Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala by winning in the Lok Sabha elections and becoming a member of parliament. During the Congress-led UPA Government rule, Tharoor served as Minister of State for External Affairs and Minister of Human Resource Development. He also serves as Chairman of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Information Technology and All India Professionals Congress.

Shashi Tharoor received the Sahitya Academy Award for his book An Era of Darkness in a non-fiction category in English language. He is an acclaimed writer, having authored 23 bestselling works of fiction and non-fiction since 1981, which are centered on India and its history, culture, film, politics, society, foreign policy, and more related themes.

## DENMARK

Denmark is a Nordic country in Northern Europe. It is the most populous and politically central constituent of the Kingdom of Denmark, a constitutionally unitary state that includes the autonomous territories of the Faroe Islands and Greenland in the North Atlantic Ocean. European Denmark is the southernmost of the Scandinavian countries, lying southwest of Sweden, south of Norway, and north of Germany.

### CAPITAL

Copenhagen, Denmark's capital, sits on the coastal islands of Zealand and Amager. It's linked to Malmö in southern Sweden by the Øresund Bridge. Indre By, the city's historic center, contains Frederiksstad, an 18th-century rococo district, home to the royal family's Amalienborg Palace. Nearby is Christiansborg Palace and the Renaissance-era Rosenborg Castle, surrounded by gardens and home to the crown jewels. As of 2021, it had a population of 5.86 million, of which 800,000 live in the capital and largest city, Copenhagen.

### GEOGRAPHICAL LOCATION

Denmark is a Scandinavian country comprising the Jutland Peninsula and numerous islands. It's linked to nearby Sweden via the Øresund bridge. Copenhagen, its capital, is home to royal palaces, colorful Nyhavn harbor, the Tivoli amusement park, and the iconic "Little Mermaid" statue. Odense is writer Hans Christian Andersen's hometown, with a medieval core of cobbled streets and half-timbered houses. Denmark's geography is characterized by flat, arable land, sandy coasts, low elevation, and a temperate climate.

### YEAR ROUND WEATHER

In Denmark, the summers are comfortable

and dry; the winters are long, cold, and wet; and it is windy and mostly clear year round. Over the course of the year, the temperature typically varies from 46°F to 76°F and is rarely below 40°F or above 88°F.

### CURRENCY

Danish krone is the official currency of Denmark. The plural is kroner. The currency is abbreviated to DKK and its symbol is kr.

#### Tivoli Gardens, Copenhagen

Dating from 1843, Tivoli is the inspiration behind the world-famous Disney theme parks, and here, you'll find a huge range of attractions including a roller coaster, roundabouts, puppet theaters, restaurants, cafés, gardens, food pavilions, and even a Moorish-styled concert hall.

Known across the world, Tivoli has appeared in numerous movies and is a true symbol of the city. At night, firework displays illuminate the sky, and in winter, the gardens are adorned with lights for the Christmas season.

During the summer, you can catch free rock concerts on Friday nights.

#### Frederiksborg Palace and the Museum of National History, Copenhagen

The stunning Frederiksborg Palace was built by King Christian IV in the early 17th century and has hosted Denmark's Museum of National History since 1878. The museum's collections focus on artwork that illustrates the country's history and includes a robust assortment of painted portraits, photography, and prints.

The museum also includes a tour of the castle's interior, where visitors can explore the rooms that once hosted royalty and nobles.

The palace's exterior and grounds include highlights like the Neptune Fountain, a pair of round towers once occupied by the court scribe and sheriff, and a beautiful relief depicting the deities Mars and Venus, which is located on the façade of the Audience House.

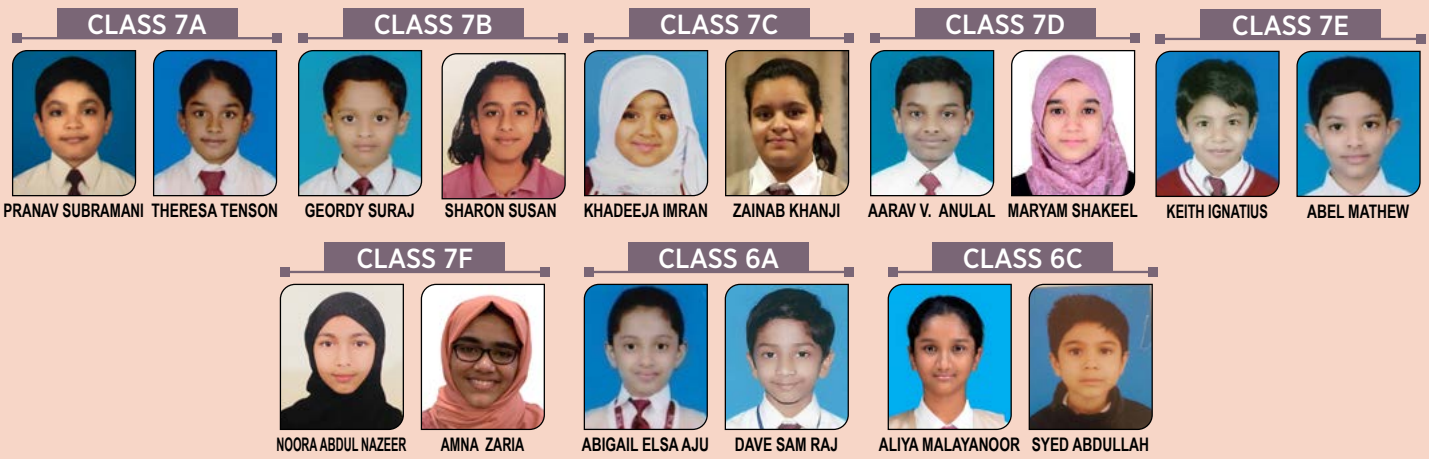

For a tourist the options are varied, each more tempting than the other.

### TAWANG MONASTERY

Tawang Monastery is the largest monastery in India and second largest in the world. It is situated on a mountain in the town of Tawang at an altitude of over 3000 m. Tawang Monastery is known in Tibetan as Galden Namgye Lhatse, which translates to “celestial paradise in a clear night.” It was founded by Merak Lama Lodre Gyatso in 1680-1681 in accordance with the wishes of the 5th Dalai Lama, Ngawang Lobsang Gyatso. It belongs to the Gelug school of Mahayana Buddhism. The monastery is three stories high and is enclosed by a 282 m long compound wall. The library of the monastery has valuable old scriptures, mainly Kangyur and Tengyur. Torgya is the most elaborate and colourful festivals celebrated in the monastery and is frequented by the tourists.



### BAP TENG KANG WATERFALL

Bap Teng Kang Waterfall is situated 80 km away from Tawang. This 100 ft high waterfall is one of the most visited tourist spots in Tawang. Set amidst lush greenery, the waterfall offers a spectacular sight to

nature lovers. Popularly referred to as the BTK waterfall, Bap Teng Kang’s serenity elevates your spirits. The crystal clear water encourages you to indulge in bathing and swimming.



### DIBRU SAIKHOWA NATIONAL PARK

Dibru Saikhowa National Park is one of those places which boast of a rich collection of flora and fauna, many of them endangered. It is one of the few remaining protected sites in the Endemic Bird Area of the Assamese Plains. It is the largest salix swamp forest in north-eastern India, with a tropical monsoon climate with a hot and wet summer and cool and usually dry winter.



### DIGBOI

Famously known as the ‘Oil City of Assam’, Digboi was discovered during the 19th century. The city has Asia’s 1st drilled oil well, which is a major tourist attraction in Assam. Tucked amid blue hills and undulating plains carpeted with emerald green tea plantations, Digboi still retains its colonial ambience. It’s simply breathtaking to have a bird’s eye view of Digboi from the famous Ridge Hill point. Digboi also has an oil museum and a wildlife sanctuary of unsurpassed beauty. Going down the hill, visitors will come across oil derricks of various types and other devices still declaring the glory and marvel of the now outdated innovation of the last forties. On the other side of the hill, one can view fabulous sceneries and it is possible to even come across a herd of elephants or a Royal

### ITAFORT

# WALT DISNEY



Walter Elias Disney (December 5, 1901 – December 15, 1966) was an American entrepreneur, animator, writer, voice actor, and film producer. A pioneer of the American animation industry, he introduced several developments in the production of cartoons.

As a film producer, he holds the record for most Academy Awards earned by an individual, having won 22 Oscars from 59 nominations. He was presented with two Golden Globe Special Achievement Awards and an Emmy Award, among other honours. Several of his films are included in the National Film Registry by the Library of Congress.

Disney developed an early interest in drawing. He took art classes as a boy and got a job as a commercial illustrator at the age of 18. He moved to California in the early 1920s and set up the Disney Brothers Studio with his brother Roy. With Ub Iwerks, he developed the character Mickey Mouse in 1928, his first highly popular success; he also provided the voice for his creation in the early years. As the studio grew, he became more adventurous, introducing synchronized sound, full-colour three-strip Technicolor, feature-length cartoons and technical developments in cameras.

In the 1950s, Disney expanded into the

amusement park industry, and in July 1955 he opened Disneyland in Anaheim, California. To fund the project he diversified into television programs, such as Walt Disney's Disneyland and The Mickey Mouse Club. He was also involved in planning the 1959 Moscow Fair, the 1960 Winter Olympics, and the 1964 New York World's Fair. In 1965, he began development of another theme park, Disney World, the heart of which was to be a new type of city, the "Experimental Prototype Community of Tomorrow" (EPCOT). Disney was a heavy smoker throughout his life and died of lung cancer in December 1966 before either the park or the EPCOT project was completed.

He remains an important figure in the history of animation and in the cultural history of the United States, where he is considered a national cultural icon. His film work continues to be shown and adapted; his namesake studio and company maintain high standards in their production of popular entertainment.

## Global Warming



Global warming or climate change has today become a major threat to the mankind. The Earth's temperature is on the rise and there are various reasons for it such as greenhouse gases emanating from carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) emissions, burning of fossil fuels or deforestation. Climate change is a long-term change in the average weather patterns that have come to define Earth's local, regional and global climates. These changes have a broad range of observed effects that are synonymous with the term. Changes observed in Earth's climate since the early 20th century are primarily driven by human activities, particularly fossil fuel burning, which increases heat-trapping greenhouse gas levels in Earth's atmosphere, raising

Earth's average surface temperature. These human-produced temperature increases are commonly referred to as global warming.

### Global Warming: A Gradual Phenomenon

Recent years have been unusually warm, causing worldwide concern. But the fact is that the increase in carbon dioxide actually began in 1800, due to the deforestation of a large chunk of North-eastern American, besides forested parts of the world. The things became worse with emissions in the wake of the industrial revolution, leading to increase in carbon dioxide level by 1900.

### Cause of Concern

According to the Intergovernmental Panel

on Climate Change (IPCC), global temperature is likely to rise by about 1-3.5 Celsius by the year 2100. It has also suggested that the climate might warm by as much as 10 degrees Fahrenheit over the next 100 years. In its Fifth Assessment Report, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, a group of 1,300 independent scientific experts from countries all over the world under the auspices of the United Nations, concluded there's a more than 95 percent probability that human activities over the past 50 years have warmed our planet.

### Impact of Global Warming

The sea levels are constantly rising as fresh water marshlands, low-lying cities, and islands have been inundated with seawater. There have been changes in rainfall patterns, leading to droughts and fires in some areas, and flooding in other areas.

Ice caps are constantly melting posing a threat to polar bears as their feeding season stands reduced.

## Sarojini Naidu (Literature/political)

Issued Date : 13.02.1964, Denomination : 15 Naya Paise.



Sarojini Naidu was born in Hyderabad on 13 February 1879. Sarojini passed her Matriculation examination from the University of Madras, but she took four years' break from her studies. In 1895, the "Nizam scholarship Trust" founded by the 6th Nizam - Mir Mahbub Ali Khan, gave her the chance to study in England first at King's College London and later at Girton College, Cambridge. Sarojini began writing at the age of 13. Her Persian play, Maher Muneer, impressed the Nawab of Hyderabad. In 1905, her first collection of poems, named "The Golden Threshold" was published. Her poems were admired by many prominent Indian politicians like Gopal Krishna Gokhale. Her collection of poems entitled "The Feather of The Dawn" was edited and published posthumously in 1961 by her daughter Padamaja. Department of Posts issued stamps Sarojini Naidu (Poetess) on her 85th Birth Anniversary.

## Sachin Tendulkar (Sports:- Cricket)

Issue Date:14 November 2013, Denomination: 2000×4



Sachin Tendulkar the name says it all. God of Cricket, Master Blaster, Cricket Legend, these are just a few titles he has been given for his extraordinary performance.

One of the greatest batsmen of the modern era and India's most adored sportsperson, Sachin Ramesh Tendulkar was born on 24th April 1973. His debut in 1989 was a fiery introduction to international cricket. Tendulkar received Arjuna Award in 1994 for his outstanding sporting achievement, the Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award in 1997, and the Padma Shri and Padma Vibhushan awards in 1999 and 2008, respectively, after few hours of his final match on 16 November 2013, the Prime Minister's Office announced the decision to award him the Bharat Ratna, India's highest civilian award.

## Samanta chandra Sekhar ( Astronomy)



Samanta Chandra Sekhar is a prominent name in traditional Indian Astronomy, who has been placed by some scholars at par with the great fours of Aryabhata, Varahamihira, Brahmagupta and Bhaskracharya. Chandra Sekhar was taught to identify stars by his father when he was a child. He developed deep insight into astronomy through self education. Finding that the stars and planets did not rise and appear at positions predicted by the ancient Siddhantas, he set out for observation, night and day, checking the figures occurring in the earlier works. He began recording his observations and making formulations of the ideas at the age of twenty three and started putting them in the form of a treatise some three years later. The Siddhanta Darpana has been written in beautiful, metrical Sanskrit verse and is a fine piece of literary work apart from being of appreciable scientific value. The Department of Posts is happy to issue a postage stamp in honour of this genius who revived traditional Indian Astronomy. The stamp design includes Gola Yantra, an instrument used by Chandra Sekhar for measuring planetary positions.

## Shri Tyagaraja ( Karnatic Music)

Issue Date:06 January 1961, Denomination:15np

Tyagaraja began composing at the age of 15 and today, several hundreds of his songs survive. He also wrote and composed two operas, Nauka Charitram and Prahlada



Bhakti Vijayam. While he was never photographed, there are several popular artistic impressions, the most popular being the one created by musician and painter S. Rajam. Tyagaraja dolls continue to adorn the famous toy exhibits in every south Indian home during the Dussehra festival. And unless it is a thematic affair, almost no Carnatic concert is complete without at least one good composition of his. In fact, Tyagaraja's compositions play a crucial role in assessing the growth of a student of Carnatic music. In no other country or culture has a poet and composer been elevated to the status of a saint, as Tyagaraja has been in India.

## Ram Nath Chopra ( Father of Indian Pharmacology)

Issue Date:17 August 1983, Denomination:50



Sir Ram Nath Chopra, acclaimed today as the Father of Pharmacology in India, was born on August 17, 1882. He obtained the degree of M.D. (Medicine) for his original work on experimental pharmacology at the Cambridge University. Chopra was appointed the first Professor of Pharmacology in the newly established Calcutta School of Tropical Medicine in 1921, while simultaneously heading the Department of Pharmacology at the Calcutta Medical College. The very first introduction and systematic study of the now well-known herb Rauwolfia serpentina (i.e. Sarpagandha of Ayurveda) was possible due to Chopra's original researches at the School of Tropical Medicine, Calcutta.. Due to Chopra's untiring efforts, the first Indian Pharmacopea, compiled in 1955, incorporated some indigenous drugs studied at the School of Tropical Medicine. Chopra's name is thus synonymous with not only Pharmacology but pioneering researches on herbal drugs in India. His glory was that of a pioneer and a crusader blazing the trail in a so far un trodden field, full of potentialities.

Webtoons are a type of digital comics that originated in south Korea by Naver (South Korea's biggest internet company) in 2004 by Junkoo Kim it was later globally released in 2014. Webtoon is a website and mobile app where comic fans come to read new episodes of their favorite comics. They are usually meant to be read digitally. Webtoons are referred to as Manhwa (만화) While webtoons were mostly unknown outside the country during their inception, there has been a surge in popularity internationally thanks to

webtoons being read on smartphones. There are over 17 million readers each month. Webtoons features a couple of common traits- each of the episodes are released on one log, they use a vertical strip which allows an infinite canvas instead of multiple pages which is easier to read on a smartphone or computer. 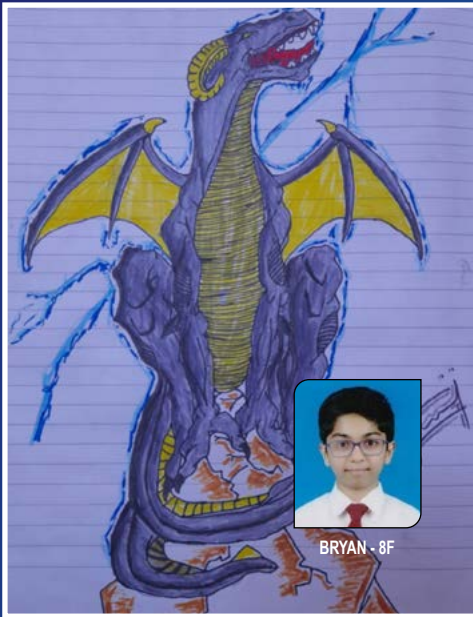
**ISRO successfully puts three satellites into orbit on board the PSLV C-52:**

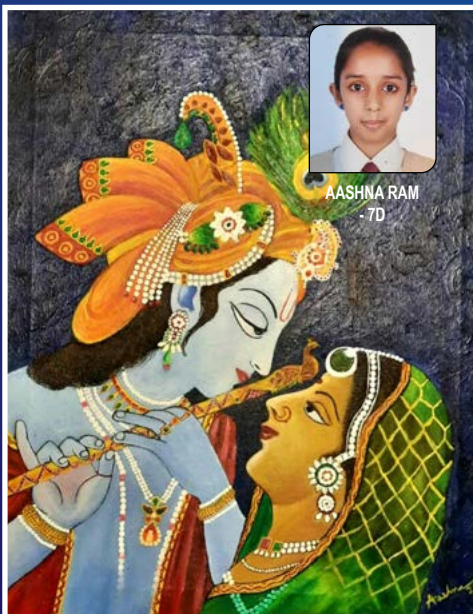

## Science of Snowfall

Technically speaking, the snow falling on mountains and other cold regions is actually just frozen water. It is formed of tiny crystals of frozen water and looks a bit like small pieces of cotton. A snowflake is an ice crystal, or an amalgamation of ice crystals, that falls to the earth from the atmosphere boasting a variety of shapes, such as hexagons, stars, flowers, needles and more. Freshly fallen snow also reflects more than 90% of the sun's heat back out into space.

Due to solar heating, there is a continuous evaporation of water from rivers, lakes, ponds, etc. On account of its low weight, water vapour rises higher in the atmosphere and transforms into clouds. As we go higher in the atmosphere, the temperature decreases. On the other hand, the capacity of air to hold water vapour decreases as temperature decreases. At a certain height, the air becomes overloaded with water vapour. Air that is teeming with water vapour and moisture is said to be in a supersaturated state. Under this state, the water vapour condenses on the smoke, and dust particles mixed in the air combine with each other to form snow crystals. When the air cannot bear the weight of these particles, they fall to Earth as snowflakes and form a blanket of snow on those regions with high enough altitude.

### Why Do We Witness Snowfall Often in the Mountains?

The possibility of snowfall on a given region depends on two key factors:

1. The altitude of the region from sea level
2. The distance of the region from the Equator. Now, the higher the altitude of the region, the greater the possibility of getting regular snowfall. Similarly, the greater the distance from the Equator, the greater the chances of snowfall in the region.

### Effect of Snowfall on the Ecosystem

Snowfall is incredibly important for our ecosystem. When it melts in the summer, the water flows down to the rivers and other water bodies. This water is then used for irrigation and basic consumption. Snow also happens to be a bad conductor of heat, due to the trapped air inside it. Thus, it acts like a warm blanket for the Earth.
